

Qantas re-launches route to Singapore Qantas, Australia's flagship carrier, has announced it will change its re-fuelling stop from London Heathrow to Sydney and back. From 25 March 2018, the new stopover hub will switch from Dubai, back to Singapore, as it was five years ago. As a more direct route, the new London-Singapore-Sydney trip will be slightly shorter. The airline also plans to increase its number of Singapore-Melbourne A380 flights next year. Following the announcement, Qantas' CEO, Alan Joyce, said the new routes via Singapore will offer "a greater choice of services, aircraft and cabins, with first and premium economy available on the A380".





Dear Austravel...

What better way to celebrate a special birthday than with a fabulous trip Down Under. That's exactly what Austraveller Susan did with her husband Chris. Here, Susan tells us about all the highlights from her travels...

We both love Australia, it's a fantastic country. This was our third visit and hopefully not the last. This time round, we were visiting for a number of reasons. I had recently retired from work and wanted to book a holiday for my 60th birthday. We were also visiting my brother John, my nephew and his girlfriend, and seeing some friends who live in Australia. So lots of people to catch up with!

We started our adventure with a stopover in Dubai to celebrate my birthday. Our stay at the Ramada Plaza on Jumeirah Beach was superb, the staff were lovely and even made me a birthday cake.

To start off our travels, we spent two weeks in Melbourne, sightseeing and meeting up with family and friends. We explored the city and went on trips to the Mornington Peninsula, the Great Ocean Road, Puffing Billy Railway, Williamstown, Altona, St Kilda and Port Melbourne. We also had an overnight visit by train to meet a friend at Lakes Entrance, which is a really beautiful coastal town.

We then spent a week in the Brisbane area and one of the highlights was our two-night stay at Tangalooma Island Resort, where we hand fed wild dolphins. We also visited the Lone Pine Koala Sanctuary and took a trip up to the Mount Coot-tha Lookout – the views across Brisbane were stunning.

Next, we flew to Darwin where it was lovely and warm all week. The AAT Kings Top End tour was an excellent way to see the nearby Kakadu and Litchfield National Parks. We also caught the local bus from Darwin to Mindil Beach Sunset Market, did a city tour and I had a swim in the lagoon at Darwin Waterfront.

We then spent a week in Perth. A visit to Kings



Park is a must, with fantastic views over the city and Swan River. We really enjoyed our day trip to Rottnest Island too. It included a bus tour around the island, plus lunch, and we also had free time to explore and look for quokkas, which are very cute little animals.

Back on the mainland, I had booked a dolphin swim cruise but unfortunately this was cancelled due to the weather, so we went on a wine tour instead, which was a great alternative. had my dolphin swim. Dubai Mall is a must visit with loads of shops, restaurants, an aquarium, ice rink, waterfall and dancing fountains. We didn't have time to visit the Burj Khalifa – but there's always next time.

ENDEAVOUR Travellers' tales



Q. What were your first impressions of the Red Centre?

The landscape is stunning, especially when you first lock eyes on Uluru. It's a moment I'll never forget.

Q. What was your favourite thing to do there?

I really enjoyed a bike ride round the base of Uluru. The route was about 12km and was pretty flat so you don't need to be an experienced cyclist to enjoy it. There were lots of places to stop and explore caves and lagoons, as well as to view Aboriginal paintings. You realise just how huge the rock is when you're standing at its base. Our guide met us at various locations, telling ancient Uluru stories (Tjukurpa) of the local Anangu people. It was fascinating.

Q. Any other must-do experiences?

Plenty! We were lucky enough to combine the amazing Field of Light installation (now extended until 31 December 2020) with the Sounds of Silence dinner. We dined under the stars before finishing the night with a mug of hot chocolate, stargazing and learning about the star constellations from a local expert.

One morning we were out by 5am for the Kata

Tjuta Sunrise & Valley of the Winds tour. The 36 domes of Kata Tjuta (aptly translated 'heads many') change colour with the rising sun – it's a spectacular time to see this wonder, and well worth the early start!

Finally, an early morning hot air balloon flight from Alice Springs. As the sun rose we just sat in awe as we watched kangaroos jump through the bush beneath us – that was probably my favourite memory from the entire trip!

Q. Any top tips for travellers visiting the Red Centre?

I'd recommend including a night at Kings Canyon Resort. That way you can get up early to conquer Kings Canyon on a Rim Walk. The resort also has a signature outback dining experience, where you can enjoy a five course dinner in a secret location under a canopy of stars.

Q. Who would you recommend this destination to?

I think the Red Centre should be on everyone's travel wish-list. It's great for all ages and offers a real outback experience. BBQs, sleeping under the stars and Uluru... you can't get more Aussie than that!











A DAY IN THE LIFE

Taronga Zoo's Nat Holdsworth shares the joys of zoo keeping



Nat Holdsworth Occupation: Zookeeper, Australian Mammals Location: Taronga Zoo, Sydney



We think Nat Holdsworth has one of the best jobs in the world, looking after the animals of Taronga Zoo in one of the most iconic cities in the world, Sydney. Here, she shares the highlights of her job.

Q. What steered you towards your profession?

I first went to Taronga Zoo as a visitor to draw the animals with a sketch group. I'd watch the keepers and think 'what an absolutely amazing job'. I have always been very passionate about conservation, which led me into my change of career – from computer programming to zoo keeping!

Q. What does a typical day as a zookeeper involve?

Early morning starts, with lots of cleaning and raking. Checking on the animals, providing enrichment activities, preparing food and feeding the animals. Then, I'd spend the rest of the day conducting tours and chatting to visitors.

Q. What's your favourite part of living and working in Sydney?

I love the views of Sydney Harbour, particularly from the zoo.

Q. What's the most enjoyable aspect of being a zookeeper?

Forming a real connection with the animals, getting them to trust you and sharing these

amazing experiences with visitors. At Taronga we do a lot of work and research to support the conservation of threatened species and it's fantastic to help visitors understand how important it is to protect our native wildlife. It's even better when they want to get involved themselves through generous donations, volunteering or even adopting an animal and becoming a Zoo Parent!

Q. What do you find most challenging about being a zookeeper?

Zoo keeping can be really physically demanding, there is lots of walking, lifting and shovelling that needs to be done come rain or shine. We have over 350 species and a total of 4,000 animals so as you can imagine, us keepers are kept very busy.

Q. Why would you recommend people visit your zoo?

To discover more about the world's remarkable wildlife including native animals to Australia, to form a connection and learn what we can do to contribute to conservation. We want to inspire people to support species and their habitats across the world. Even through simple actions and choices in your everyday life, you can make a difference for the wildlife around you. While caring for our animals is a big part of our job at the zoo, educating visitors is almost as important.

Q. If you could work anywhere else in the world, where would you choose and why?

I've always wanted to visit Papua New Guinea to see some of their unique species, such as birds of paradise and long-beaked echidnas. That's definitely on my bucket list!

Q. Who is the most interesting person you've met on the job and why?

I am forever inspired by some of the other keepers who have worked at the zoo for over 20 years and are still truly passionate and enthusiastic about their job.

Q. What is the most memorable experience you've had at the zoo?

It was so exciting being involved with a royal visit from the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge. I assisted with training our bilby George – a small endangered Australian marsupial – in preparation for him to meet Prince George. It was a special day for the whole zoo.



Q. If you could take anyone around on your tour – who would you choose and why?

Dr. Jane Goodall, renowned primatologist, ethologist and anthropologist. She is an incredible inspiration and has worked non-stop throughout her life to encourage people to make a difference for animals in the wild. It would be a privilege to meet her in person.

Q. When you're not at the zoo, what do you do on your days off?

I currently study part-time, undertaking a Bachelor of Biodiversity and Conservation degree, so that takes up a chunk of my time. I also enjoy travelling around Australia and seeing animals in the wild. Nothing beats seeing healthy populations of our native wildlife in their natural habitat.

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



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72 HOURS in the Blue Mountains & Hunter Valley

Experience some of New South Wales' best sights on a journey that will delight and astound the senses. Here's how to make the most of three days in the Blue Mountains and beyond.



DAY 1

Morning

Set off early into Sydney's wild backyard. After driving an hour inland, you'll enter the lush, green expanse that is the World Heritage-listed Blue Mountains. Follow the winding roads for another half hour and arrive at Fairmont Resort; home for the next two nights. Located in the charming mountain village of Leura, Fairmont boasts 222 charming boutique-style rooms and suites some with panoramic views of Jamison Valley. Once settled in, it's time for lunch. Take a short stroll into Leura's centre and you'll find an array of food experiences, from resident chocolatiers to tiny tearooms. Afternoon

One we recommend is the 1.3-kilometre Minni Ha Ha Track in north Katoomba. The track takes you along Yosemite Creek and down into a valley where you'll find the serene Minnehaha Falls, cradled by sandstone cliffs. If it's a warm day, bring a towel; the swimming hole at the base is perfect for cooling off. Alternatively, hire a mountain bike for the afternoon and pedal at your own pace along one of Katoomba's many cycle-friendly trails. Remember to look out for native birds and wildlife along the way too.

DAY

Morning

Wake up and enjoy your Fairmont breakfast accompanied by the spectacular views of the valley blanketed in morning mist. Today it's back to Katoomba for another dose of nature and striking landscapes, and there's nowhere better for this than Scenic World. No words or photos can do justice to this vast expanse of mountains and forest; it's a view you must see for yourself. Echo Point is also the gateway to many fantastic walks, from the easy pathway leading to the Three Sisters, to the more challenging Giant Stairway which descends over 800 steps to the valley floor below – suitable for the energetic only. For your final meal in the Blue Mountains, we recommend Silk's Brasserie in Leura. With its soaring ceiling, grand bar and chequerboard floor, it certainly has the 'special occasion' factor.
