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First Nations of Australasia

40,000 years before there was Australia there were Aborigines. Before the Portuguese explored the Southern Hemisphere, the greatest seafarers in the South Pacific were Polynesian. Seven hundred years before James Cook set foot on New Zealand, Maoris had called the Land of the Long White Cloud their home. These indigenous people of Down Under created a legacy so deep, rich and vibrant that it's only fitting we discover their heritage, traditions and legends.

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AUSTRALIA: MIGHTY ULURU AND ABORIGINAL ROCK ART

Uluru (Ayers Rock) is of immense cultural significance to Australia. Here you will find evidence of Aboriginal settlements dating back 10,000 years. Sacred to the local Anangu tribe, according to legend Uluru was formed during the 'Dreamtime'. Ancient rock art found in caves nearby clearly show Aboriginal ancestral beliefs, legends, laws and tribal rituals. Today local indigenous people are available to lead tours so that visitors can learn all about 'the rock', the ancient people and their arts and crafts, including traditional bushcraft. This will not only enhance your experience but it could also change the way you perceive the world and our place within it.

Situated in the Top End of the Northern Territory to the west of Darwin, Kakadu is an enormous, biodiverse nature preserve. It provides a unique opportunity to encounter not only the extraordinary wildlife, surrounding wetlands and limestone escarpments, but when you discover rock art that dates back 20,000 years you begin to realise its cultural and spiritual significance, and how the Aboriginal community have an increasingly important role to play in the stewardship of modern Australia.







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NEW ZEALAND: HAKA, HONGI AND HANGI

As the legend goes, Kupe was a great chief and fearless explorer who left his island on legendary Hawaiki (Tahiti). After many adventures on the high seas, in which he overcame numerous monsters and sea demons, he came upon a mysterious island shrouded in mist. He called the bountiful island Aotearoa or Land of the Long White Cloud – thus New Zealand was discovered. Kupe returned to Hawaiki where he inspired others to discover the beauty of Aotearoa for themselves. We suggest you do the same. Like the great Polynesian adventurers of old, you may never want to leave.

THINGS TO SEE AND DO

1) WAITANGI TREATY HOUSE – BAY OF ISLANDS

The Waitangi Treaty Grounds is the place where the treaty between the Maoris and the British Crown was signed in 1840. The agreement was called for by Maori chiefs in an effort to curb lawlessness of the new settlers, to protect the balance of culture upon the islands. Although still a contentious document today, the treaty is seen as an important artefact of New Zealand history and a foundation upon which the country still rests.

2) TE ARAROA TRAIL

Along the Te Araroa Trail (the Long Pathway) near the small town of the same name, you can find a Pohutukawa tree known as Te Waha-o-Rerekohu, estimated to be over 600 years old. This tree is of cultural significance because the species is widely found across the Pacific, so when the early Polynesians arrived in Aotearoa, the sight of the tree instilled in them the belief that they had found a new home.

3) TE PAPA MUSEUM

Te Papa is New Zealand's national bi-cultural museum located in Wellington. It has a permanent exhibition dedicated to the culture, history and legends of the Maori people. The exhibition celebrates the ancestral treasures, contemporary art and stories of New Zealand's indigenous people.

4) TAMAKI VILLAGE ROTORUA

At the Tamaki Village in Rotorua, Maori songs and the traditional Haka dance are performed, plus you'll take a tour of Whakatane (carved Maori houses). Receive the nose-pressing greeting called Hongi, where both nose and forehead touch and the breath of life is shared. Once the Hongi is shared the visitor is no longer a stranger but regarded as one of their people, and one who now shares a responsibility to look after the land. The sharing of food is an important part of the Maori custom and you'll be invited to join the villagers for a traditional Hangi buffet – where food is cooked using heated rocks buried in a fire pit, creating a delicious smoky taste to meat and vegetables. **Prices from £48 per person** ►

SOUTH PACIFIC: A BULA WELCOME

The South Pacific Ocean is blessed with thousands of tropical islands containing rainforests and palm fringed, picturesque beaches. However, returning travellers always remark not only of the paradise setting, but also of the famed warmth of the islanders themselves. Once again we find that paradise is never complete without strong cultural ties to its people.

Friendliness might just have been invented in Fiji. On the islands you'll be welcomed with a Bula song and dance. The experience is so magical, little wonder Fiji is becoming increasingly popular as a wedding destination. When you visit a village you'll enjoy a Kava ceremony; where it's customary to present a gift of yaqona (Kava root) to the head of the village.

In the Cook Islands, beachside luxury combines with island traditions and stunning tropical landscape. On the isle of Rarotonga immerse yourself in cultural experiences at Te Vara Nui Cultural Village and overwater show, to feast on freshly caught mahi-mahi and steaming coconut curry, while tribal fire-dancers illuminate the tropical night sky.

Travellers' Tales...

Our Travel Designer Louise discovered the delights of Australia and encountered a dazzling stopover in Dubai on her return journey. We asked her for the highlights of her trip.



You started in Sydney - what was your favourite excursion?

Without a shadow of doubt it was the Sydney Bridge Climb. Soak up the stunning views from 143m high and learn about the city and how the bridge was built. If you are short on time, there is an express climb option to ensure you don't miss out on this experience.

Where did your adventure take you next?

We headed inland to the Blue Mountains, for a stay at the One&Only Wolgan Valley. Four words describe this resort – out of this world! It's the ultimate relaxation retreat where you can simply unwind, or grab your mountain bike and explore the 7,000 acres of land surrounding the resort. Hire a ranger for a guided walk, run or cycle, for an informative tour of this stunning region.

How would you describe Hayman Island?

There is no place better than Hayman Island for peace and relaxation. With a backdrop of stunning white sand and aqua blue waters, it's the emerald jewel of the Whitsunday Islands.

Who would you recommend this destination for?

It has everything you could desire. The luxurious One&Only Hayman Island Resort accommodates children and adults effortlessly – there's a fantastic kids' club. The hotel offers a host of activities, including paddle boarding and snorkelling, plus tennis and squash courts. There are seven incredible restaurants to choose from, my favourite dining experience was at Fire, where lenjoyed a sizzling steak. Hayman Island Resort really is a well-equipped five-star experience and I recommend partnering this retreat with Wolgan Valley for an uber luxurious holiday.

It sounds blissful. Is there anything on Hayman Island for those who like a little more adventure?

We arranged a 20 minute helicopter tour to capture the amazing views of Whitehaven Beach from above. It's great value for money and when you land, you step out on to the squeaky silica sand to take a stroll on the edge of the blue calming waters. You can even arrange a champagne picnic on the beach. If you prefer keeping your feet on the ground, a short walk to the pristine Blue Pearl Bay uncovers multi-coloured coral. In my opinion Hayman Island was the perfect end to an exhilarating trip Down Under.

What did you think about Dubai?

I have never visited Dubai before and I was instantly hooked. Not only is it a great stopover destination to beat jet lag when travelling to Australia but the city will thrill you with its towering ambition.

What would you recommend to see and do in Dubai?

Everyone should experience the Burj Khalifa – the tallest building in the world. The 30 second lift up 128 floors to the top is exhilarating. Then, step out and take in the 180 degree views and see which famous landmarks you can spot. It's always best to pre-arrange tickets as the price triples on the day if you turn up to book.

As an alternative, head to Aquaventure at Atlantis the Palm. It's one of the most thrilling water parks in the world and suitable for all ages – plus you don't have to stay at the Atlantis to visit the park.

Jennie Bond



Jennie Bond's love affair with Australia began in 1988, when she covered the visit of the Prince and Princess of Wales as a Royal Correspondent. Since, she's followed the royals on a handful of trips Down Under and took part on a famous TV show in the heart of the Queensland rainforest, here she shares her favourite memories from her travels to Australia. I remember so vividly the day the call came. "Jennie, how do you feel about going to Australia to cover the visit by the Prince and Princess of Wales?" The year was 1988 and I was a general reporter at the BBC in London. I knew

very little about the Royal Family and even less about Australia. A couple of weeks later, I was on a plane to the other side of the world to report not only on the royal visit, but on Australia's bi-centennial celebrations. I suppose it was love at first sight.

Sydney was, and is, a knock-out. Vibrant, buzzing, young and beautiful. I'm not a city lover, but as I discovered then and on subsequent visits, so many of Australia's major cities are beach playgrounds as well. It was hard not to smirk as I filmed on Bondi Beach in searing January heat while my BBC colleagues shivered back home.

And modern Australia is an exotic melting pot of cuisines, cultures and traditions. I've never felt so alive nor eaten such a fabulous choice of delicious food from around the globe.

That first trip took Charles, Diana and their press party onwards to a scorching Adelaide, where I was mesmerised by the paddle steamers making their way down the Murray River. It seemed more like New Orleans than South Australia. I promised myself then that I'd find time to go back and take a cruise on one of those steamers...and, one day, I shall!

But, for a sheer sense of adventure, nothing beats the Northern Territory. I felt a real pioneering spirit in Darwin, where they insisted I should always keep one eye over my shoulder in case a saltwater crocodile came sauntering down the street! I did see them in the bay: huge and magnificently scary. And, from Darwin it's an easy stretch to the vast and wonderful Kakadu National Park, with its Aboriginal rock art paintings, where you really can get up close and personal with saltwater crocs.

There is so much to see and do in Australia – I've barely scratched the surface. From the tropics of Darwin to the cool, clear skies of Tasmania (where my cameraman and I were stranded on a mountain top and had to watch helplessly from a distance as the royal entourage motored by), there is an adventure to be had at every stop.

And I certainly had an adventure or two when I spent a couple of weeks in the Queensland rainforest in ITV's I'm A Celebrity Get Me Out of Here. Not many people

have been buried in a coffin full of rats or eaten a variety of live Australian insects and creepie crawlies on TV. I'm proud to have been one of them, but I'm sure there are many more pleasurable pursuits to be had

People often ask me for my favourite memory of my 14 years as the BBC's Royal Correspondent. And I suppose it should be some momentous, historic occasion. But, in all honesty – it's sitting in a Jacuzzi on Fraser Island, off the coast of Brisbane, with my fellow royal reporters. It was midnight and blissfully balmy. The Jacuzzi was fringed by bottles of chilled white wine. Prince Charles was already in bed. Our working day was over. It was sheer heaven.

Meet Guided Walks New Zealand guide Travis Donoghue, who shares with us his love for New Zealand and why you simply must visit.

I've been in Queenstown on and off for 10 years and keep coming back probably for good this time! Currently I'm working as a Hiking and Snowshoe guide

for Guided Walks New Zealand. This entails taking both group and private walking tours into the Mt Aspiring Park, however we can work as far north as Mt Cook and down to Te Anau and also into the Hollyford Track where we have private lodges.

Being a guide, I definitely have the best job because I love showing off New Zealand and talking about the country. I get to be out with guests, and although we regularly see the same thing it's a different experience with each group of people. Sometimes it's surprising what exactly gives our guests a buzz, but it's always a great moment to find out.

It's the knowledge and stories of our guides that bring a place to life — transforming the scenery into an experience that is truly memorable. I think most people look at a forest as simply that, when actually it's an eco-system with so many layers that are interconnected. We also know when the time is right to stop and reflect. Our bush offers a great opportunity for spotting native birds. Not having a flight instinct makes these guys one of the highlights but you have to let them come to you rather than the other way around.

Here in New Zealand you're not restricted by the time of year, either. We have walks that run year-round and the tracks suit all weather conditions. Our settled southern climate means you can have it all, from downpours in a temperate rainforest to crisp and clear winter days - but of course it's still up to Mother Nature which one you experience!

Our most popular summer walk is undoubtedly the Routeburn Valley; we have a lot of guide options here and even the ability to go off trail which is pretty unique. It's awesome to take people to where only the fantails and bush robins hang out.

In the winter Snowshoeing takes over with most of it focused on the Remarkables. We can use the ski field road to get up quickly into the snow and heading off into Lake Alta is a pretty special spot regardless of the weather. It's good to have such big differences between the seasons and keeps us guides fresh. We make sure that our guests have all the preparation they need for the tours, but we aim to get going guickly and provide many 'wow' moments along the way - this could be a route that nobody else outside Guided Walks New Zealand knows or it could be introducing you to the smallest species in our forest. Depending on the walk we'll also have morning tea or lunch: there is nothing quite as special as a hot cup of tea in the middle of nowhere! 🕰
